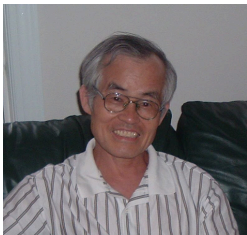


IN LOVING MEMORY OF

He believed fate had brought them together.

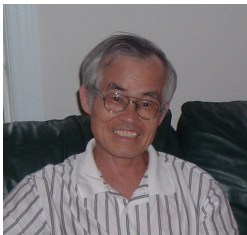
